What important trend, change, or challenge have you seen evolve during the past two years in the field of technical communication?

Technical communicators offer a broad set of skills, as well as the ability to drive continuously evolving processes, tools, and deliverables to better serve the end user. We are a diverse group that not only writes documentation, proposals, specifications, white papers and more, but creates simulations, Web sites, wikis, podcasts, and other forms of assistance—all in an effort to make our users more successful.

This constant innovation and diversity bring two challenges: First, a challenge as professionals to learn and grow; and, second, a challenge to STC to be the leader in providing a variety of resources—training courses, seminars, conferences, even books—to make it possible.

Describe your STC service, honors, and awards

I am the immediate past president of the Pittsburgh chapter. During my presidency, Pittsburgh was recognized as a chapter of excellence; during my vice presidency, as a chapter of distinction. I was on the planning committee of the Region 4 Conference

"Writers Without Borders: Trends in Technical Communication" held April 2004 in Pittsburgh. I also served as membership chair and have been involved with program planning for four years.

I have presented talks at several STC annual conferences, both

during general sessions and on Leadership Day. I have contributed several cover articles to *Tieline*, the Society leaders' newsletter.

My Society honors include an Award of Merit for online communication from the Pittsburgh chapter.

Describe your education and other (non-STC) professional affiliations, honors, and awards

I earned a B.A. in journalism from the Pennsylvania State University, where I was a member of the University Scholars Program. I have continued my education, taking additional courses in VBA, *Excel*, XML, and HTML at the University of Pittsburgh Computer Learning Center.

I am a member of the American Society for Training and Development, the Pittsburgh Regional Knowledge Management Consortium, and the Pittsburgh eLearning Society.

What is your professional experience?

I have been a technical communicator for twelve years. Like many of us, I started my career writing books and producing them in hardcopy format, but have since embraced online help and user assistance, Web design, single-sourcing, usability, e-learning, and knowledge management. I have experience writing for products in a variety of industries; including media sales, industrial automation, simulation, and pharmacy.

I have given talks at the STC national, local, and regional levels, and I have been pleased to share my experience with other STC leaders on Leadership Day at the annual conference. I have presented at other national conferences and local meetings as well. Topics have included

various tools and technologies, user assistance design, single sourcing, and wikis for knowledge management. I have been published in conference proceedings and on the Web, as well as in the online newsletters *Tieline* (published by STC) and STC Pittsburgh's *Blue Pencil*.

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The Fun Factor: December Chapter Meeting Combines Good Food and Good Info By Bryce Walat

The extremely fun December chapter meeting and holiday party, held December 18, combined hot hors d'oeuvres, tasty cookies, and an insightful presentation on E-Learning by Sheldon Murphy.

E-Learning is a \$25-50 billion industry that is expected to grow by more than 30 percent in the next five years. In his talk, "The Fun Factor: Make E-Learning Interesting with Good Writing Techniques," Sheldon discussed how "content is king" when it comes to developing effective and interesting e-learning. Good content comes from subject matter expertise, creative writing, and solid instructional design.

Developing good content involves having the right people on your team, knowing your audience, and following the "Platinum Rule" of doing unto your audience as they would do unto themselves.

While general principles of good writing apply to elearning, writing for e-learning is different from writing for traditional teaching materials or web sites because success in writing for e-learning involves carrying out the objectives defined in the instructional design process and bringing about behavioral change beyond simple understanding of concepts — "learning to do" something rather than just understanding.

Sheldon then shared tips and techniques for writing content, doing voiceovers, and writing exercise and test questions, such as using a positive tone, using realistic scenarios, limiting on-screen text, and engaging learners, to name a few.

Sheldon ended the meeting when he showed the group examples of effective and not-so-effective learning materials. Some of the examples from the latter group were laugh-out-loud-until-your-sides-ached bad!

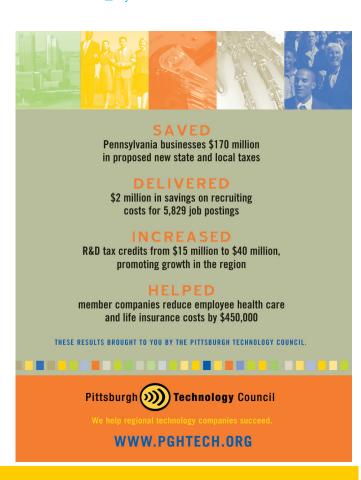
